

Departure Have A Safe Flight Home

With Alan Guidenti's cooperation the Club bought an overhauled Duke generator. Available in an emergency to keep you in the air. For the time being contact Jim Gorman or Jeff Gorman at (419/755-1223 (Ohio time). Plans not yet firmed up, would be to stock the generator at an overhaul shop. It would be shipped to you at the same time you forward your overhaulable generator to them. Charges would be the cost to yellow tag yours which now becomes the excharge unit.


"I have finally been able to put something together for you on the exhaust pipe problem reported to you last month.

As you will recall, during take-off power run up, I noticed the needles starting to split slightly. When brakes were release they split significantly. At that point, I started the abort take-off procedures. We found the following:

The intermediate exhaust pipe from turbo charger had become disengaged from the bracket and was, of course, dumping the exhaust gas to atmosphere. The modification as described in the attached Lycoming service bulletin #479 was accomplished a little over 500 hours ago to my Duke #582. What was determined was - with the heating and cooling of this section of pipe, it became deformed to less than perpendicular causing separation from the insertion of adjoining pipe. The heating and cooling also must have caused the bracket to deform causing it to become loose.

It was recommended by our mechanic in his report to FAA that Lycoming might consider another 1" of pipe to allow deeper insertion into adjoining pipe. It is also recommended to our fellow flyers that this be checked at each oil change and, for sure, during annual check up. Believe me this is not something that one wants to experience."

- 2. Disassemble the P/N LW-15437 cable assembly installed per Service Bulletin No. 476 to help prevent separation of the slip joint.
- 3. Remove the P/N LW-12093-5 V-band coupling and P/N 78083 metal gasket.
- 4. Remove the P/N 78187 or 77430 right rear exhaust pipe and the P/N 77429 right intermediate exhaust pipe.




Figure 2. Inspecting P/N 77429 Right Intermediate Exhaust Pipe

- 5. Inspect the P/N 77429 right intermediate exhaust pipe for any signs of rubbing at the area shown in Figure 2. If any signs of rubbing and/or wear are present, the pipe should be replaced.

Pioneer Mrs. Beech is remembered for her many contributions

ichita's Olive Ann Beech was a unique woman.

She was appointed by presidents to serve on national advisory boards. She was touted by national magazines for her extraordinary business skills. She was celebrated in aviation and business halls of

fame.

With her husband Walter, Ms. Beech founded one of the world's most significant general aviation manufacturing companies. She was a mother, a grandmother, a patron of the arts. And when she died Monday at the age of 89, she left a wonderful legacy to her city, her state and her nation.

Among the many places where pictures and commentary about her contributions to aviation appear is the Smithsonian's National Air and Space Museum in Washington, D.C. But it is rare, indeed, to find any facility dedicated to American aviation where she is not featured. Although not a pilot or an engineer, she was the driving business presence behind the successful efforts of Beech Aircraft Corp. for three decades. She made aviation history and she will always be remembered for that accomplishment.

But Mrs. Beech also will be remembered by Kansans for her generosity to the arts, to education and to civic and business organizations. She gave her time and she gave her money to support The Wichita Center for the Arts, Music Theater and the Wichita Symphony. Two institutions of higher learning that were recipients of her altruism — Southwestern College and Wichita State University — awarded her honorary degrees. Wesley Medical Center, Wichita YWCA and the Women's Crisis Center, 4-H clubs, Girl Scouts and the First Methodist Church in Wichita all benefited from her belief in and dedication to community service.

Her friends and family will remember her for her quiet grace, and her resolve from the time of her retirement in 1982 to avoid interviews. They will remember her as someone who had steely determination, but was also kind and considerate. They will recall her humor, her enjoyment in playing cards and her warmth. To them she is best described in the words of one of her closet friends as "loving, lovely, lovable and beloved."

Olive Ann Beech contributed much to the history of aviation and to Wichita. She was a woman whose success came at a time when women were not routinely accepted in the business world.

She was a star in the skies where her airplanes flew.

There will never be anyone else quite like her.
